

Joanne Leedom-Ackerman is a novelist, short story writer, and journalist. Her works of fiction include *The Dark Path to the River* and *No Marble Angels*. She has also published fiction and essays in books and anthologies, including *Short Stories of the Civil Rights Movement, Remembering Arthur Miller, Snakes: An Anthology of Serpent's Tales, Beyond Literacy, Women For All Seasons, Fiction and Poetry by Texas Women, The Bicentennial Collection of Texas Short Stories,* and *What You Can Do.* 

Ms. Leedom-Ackerman's books have been reviewed in numerous publications, including *The New York Times Book Review*, *The Los Angeles Times, The Washington Post, The Christian Science Monitor, The Philadelphia Inquirer, The Baltimore Sun, The Dallas Morning News, Publishers' Weekly, Kirkus, Library Journal.* 

A former reporter for *The Christian Science Monitor*, Ms. Leedom-Ackerman has won awards for her nonfiction and has published hundreds of articles in newspapers and magazines.

Ms. Leedom-Ackerman has taught advanced fiction writing in the Writers' Program at the University of California at Los Angeles extension, New York University, City University of New York, and Occidental College. She holds Master of Arts degrees from Brown University and Johns Hopkins University and graduated cum laude from Principia College.

Ms. Leedom-Ackerman is the International Secretary of International PEN and a Vice President of International P.E.N., former Trustee of the International P.E.N. Foundation and former Chair of International P.E.N.'s Writers in Prison Committee. She is past president of PEN Center USA West and currently serves on the board of the PEN Faulkner Foundation in Washington, DC. She is on the Board of Directors of Poets and Writers, Human Rights Watch, and the International Crisis Group. She is also a member of the Board of Trustees of Johns Hopkins University and emeritus trustee of Brown University and former Advisory Board member of the Brown Women Writers Project and the Woodrow Wilson National Fellowship Foundation. She has served on the Board of Directors of the Albert Einstein Institution and Save the Children and currently serves on Save the Children's Advisory Board on Early Childhood Development. She was an adviser on the Emmy-nominated PBS documentary, A Force More Powerful: A Century of Nonviolent

*Conflict.* She is a member of American P.E.N., P.E.N. USA, English P.E.N. and the Authors' Guild.
